Alexander Graham Bell discovered for himself something that was almost revolutionary in those days: that children responded better to sympathy and patience than to the bullying methods that were more usual in schools then. He worked hard to get his deaf pupils to understand and experience, if only at second hand, the world of sound.

He would explain how vibrations made sound waves which, in turn, produced vibrations in the ears of people with normal hearing. He would get the children to hold a balloon while he spoke with his lips against it so that they could feel the vibrations. He would demonstrate with a feather how the breath was controlled in speaking. He would place the children's hands on his larynx so that they could feel the vibrations of his vocal cords as he made different sounds. In this way,

they learned to distinguish between pairs of sounds which are very similar, such as "p" and "b" or "s" and "z". He convinced children who had never heard a sound in their lives that they, too, could learn to speak and make themselves understood.

His success with children whose parents had feared would never speak was remarkable, and his fame as a teacher of the deaf quickly spread far beyond Boston.
